GENERAL ANIMAL MOVEMENT INFORMATION FOR ACCREDITED VETERINARIANS

A. Obtaining Certificates of Veterinary Inspection for Domestic Travel

- 1. Order paper Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (CVIs) Livestock and Poultry (CDFA Form 77-010) from:

- Obtain the U.S. Interstate and International Certificate of Health Examination for Small Animals (APHIS Form 7001) from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) website - http://www.aphis.usda.gov/library/forms/pdf/APHIS7001.pdf. Many states no longer accept the APHIS Form 7001. Check with the destination state to determine entry requirements and which forms are accepted.
- 3. CDFA encourages the use of electronic CVIs (eCVIs). Current service providers include:

- 3. Obtain airline-specific requirements from the **airline carrier** used for movement of the animal(s). Some airline carriers have additional required statements of health for inclusion on a CVI.

C. Responsibilities of Accredited Veterinarians Preparing Certificates of Veterinary Inspection

1. Reminders

- CVIs must be completed in compliance with U.S. federal requirements (9 CFR Part 161 and Part 86), with requirements of the state/country of destination, and with the airline if shipment is by air.
- Certificates are generally valid for 30 days from the date of <u>animal inspection</u>.
- The CVI and supporting movement documents must be retained by the accredited veterinarian for five (5) years for large animals and three (3) years for small animals.
- Incomplete CVIs may result in quarantine of the shipped animal(s) and/or other actions deemed necessary until entry requirements have been met.

2. Distribution of CVIs

- A copy of the completed CVI should be retained by the accredited veterinarian, accompany the animal(s) in the shipment, and be distributed to both the origin and destination states. Distribution varies depending on the form used.
 - Livestock and Poultry (CDFA Form 77-010): Send the white and yellow colored carbon copies with one (1) copy of supporting documents, if applicable, to CDFA's Animal Health Branch Headquarters within seven (7) days from the date issued. Supporting movement documents may include breed registration papers, identification lists, or disease testing records, for example, and should reference the CVI number. California will send all documents to the destination state.
 - Small Animals (APHIS Form 7001): Provide the owner with the completed and signed original document. Send a copy of the document to the destination state only. Do not send a copy to CDFA.
 - eCVIs: Consult the provider to determine if eCVIs are automatically distributed to origin and destination states upon issuance. If not, the accredited veterinarian is responsible for providing copies to the origin and destination states. Contact the eCVI provider to determine how supporting movement documents are provided to the states.
